


Lachie McLachlan of Outram (Otago) was also re-elected and starts his second term. He is on both the Promotion and Sales Committee.

John P. Absolom

Farms the well known Rissington property which has the largest herd of Simmentals in the country. The property is an extensive hill country holding and also maintains a sheep flock and a small Angora herd. The Rissington Stud was founded in 1972 (Breeding females 383). John was elected to Council in 1984.

Rodney N.S. Cox

An inaugural member of the Society he farms at the Levels near Timaru on an arable property carrying a Romney stud, cropping and one of the largest (and one of the original) Simmental herds in the South Island (Breeding females 75). OBITUARIES

RUPERT MARTIN from Redwoods Valley in Nelson ran one of the largest Simmental enterprises ever established in this country - almost a thousand registered Simmentals. Transport Nelson developed a huge block of waste land into a highly productive farm unit as an example of what could be done with marginal land. Rupert, under his management, saw it evolve from gorse and pine trees into hundreds of acres of stocked pastoral land. For his efforts he received the Grasslands Award and also the Simmental Promotion Trophy. Regrettably changes of management in TNL decided the property should be sold and the herd was dispersed. Rupert settled on a small block and ran a few of his favourite Simmentals and a rapidly expanding flock of coloured sheep from which wool and skins found an ever increasing export market.

Despite only a small interest in Simmentals Rupert continued to project and promote the breed at every opportunity and was largely responsible for the continuance of the Marlborough/Nelson Club which in the past few years has considerably expanded its list of breeders. Anything to do with Simmentals in the Marlborough/Nelson area (and frequently out of it) was always attended by Rupert - he was an enthusiast and one of lifes 'givers' who did not look for reward.

His sudden death was as he would have wished it - out in his paddocks looking at his stock which he dearly loved. He will be missed in the area for all the things he did for other people - no Simmental event will seem quite the same without him.

To Grace and her family we offer our sincere condolences.

Members will be saddened by the news of the untimely loss of one of our well known Northland breeders, TERRY SLOANE. Terry suffered a fatal heart attack at the end of November. One of our early members Terry and his wife Lynne have been tremendous supporters of the breed and the Society, having attended Simmental events throughout the country on a regular basis. Their herd at Mata has grown into a large enterprise which has held its own annual bull sale over a number of years. Earlier this year the Sloanes were one of the hosts at a most successful Northland Field Day. The Northland area has established into a strong Simmental area and Terry will be missed by those many people who were fortunate enough to know him.



PROFILE

The Maruia Valley is one of the more remote areas of the South Island running almost due North, off the Lewis pass Road which connects Canterbury to Westland. In the early days it was noted for its timber and gold and some areas still show the neatly stacked stones left by the Chinese who re-worked the gold fields after the Europeans. The Shenandoha Road once a rough track is now a greatly improved and sealed highway used as an alternative to the East Coast Road as a route to Nelson.



The area is now almost exclusively used farming with a cross section of sheep, beef, deer and dairying on the flats adjacent to the Maruia River which joins the Buller just upstream from Inangahua. The Valley is narrow and shut in by mountains, heavily bush clad, on both sides.


Bill Macbeth became a member of the Simmental Society in June, 1986 and started to build up a herd of cattle which he agisted on various properties before deciding he must get them a permanent home where the stud could be developed. He settled on the Maruia Valley and took up Dunsinane Hill in March, 1988.

The property of some 1,100 acres is set on the North Bank of the Maruia River and comprises of

some 750 acres of developed flats a hill country bounding the bush line. Large areas of bush still stand within the property boundaries. With an average rainfall of over 70 inches and top-dressing the country grows prolific grass. Bill runs a flock of over 2,000 pure Drysdale sheep producing wool exclusively for the carpet industry, a commercial beef herd and a rapidly developing Simmental Stud. He also leases another adjoining (totalling around 800 acres) adjoining which gives him a large are where he agisted a lot of cattle during last year's Canterbury drought. Born in Australia from Irish parents Bill came to New Zealand in 1965. He is two people, one, the city dwelling Professor of Surgery with the University of Otago and two, the farmer of Dunsinane Hill in the Maruia Valley. His high degree of professional ability does not cease at his surgery door. In three short years he has fine tuned himself to understand livestock production and management. He can exchange one pair of surgical gloves for another and complete his own A.I. programme. He gets himself totally involved in a hands on situation in the day to day running of his property and understands precisely what he is about.

Bills medical involvement precludes him from visiting the property as frequently as he would like but it is run on highly professional lines by his resident Manager, Derek Brown who has wide experience in livestock and property management. Both he and Bill have common objectives - an efficient tidy and productive property on which the Simmental section is a very important factor. The Cawdor Stud will eventually be stabilised as an eighty cow herd. Bill's interest in the rural scene is shared with his wife, Jean, and his family who often visit the property.



USE OF A.I./ FOLLOW-UP BULLS

In a circular sent out in August we printed the undernoted article on the use of follow- up bulls. Somehow we added an extra word to 'note 1' which had the effect of negating the interpretation. The last sentence of this paragraph should read:-

'Hence fixed time matings are of particular concern when insemination is not done at detection of standing heat' (the word 'not' was erronously added after 'are').

We repeat the article in its correct context:-

The attention of breeders using A.I. is drawn to the use of follow-up bulls. Most breeders using A.I. depasture the cow with a follow-up bull following A.I. mating to ensure anything that does not 'hold' to A.I. is naturally mated.

At a recent Meeting of the Technical Committee this procedure was discussed and concern was expressed that the interval between A.I. service and the introduction of a follow-up bull may not always be sufficient to ensure the calf born is by the sire specified. Four noteworthy points have been made by a Verterinarian which we repeat:

- 1. It has been shown that 70% of normally cycling females synchronised for A.I. will cycle at 3 4 days and that up to 7% may still not have cycled after ten days. Hence fixed time matings are of particular concern when the insemination is not done at detection of standing heat.
- 2. At the beginning of the breeding season females may have short cycles of 7 10 days length, so they may cycle as little as seven days after an induced cycle.
- 3. Cows may calve at 288 plus or minus 10 days post mating, therefore calving date alone cannot be an accurate indicator of parentage.
- 4. Breeders ability to recognise the progeny of follow-up bulls cannot be relied on, particularly when using young and/or unproven bulls.

To overcome any such doubts about the progeny's sire the Committee resolved that a follow-up bull should be withheld for a minimum of ten days and preferably fifteen days.

In simple terms do not A.I. your cow and release her into a paddock with a follow-up bull.


AVON PARK/EAST DOME HEIFER SALE

As the day approached there was some speculation as to what might happen but those nail-biting vendors need not of worried. An excellent presentation of cattle, sound organisation and preparation make for a good sale.


The sale was attended by over 200 people mainly from the South Island but with a few from as far away as Hastings and New Plymouth.

The catalogue comprised of a small group of cows, two year old heifers and yearling heifers with some top flight entries throughout. Prices reached no records but were very sound and maintained throughout to the last lot with realistic return according to quality. The catalogue was dispersed over both Islands with thirteen going to North Island purchasers.

Top price of the day was for Lot 1, an excellent Hockenhull Magnum cow (born 1986) from an imported embryo from the well known Sterling herd in U.K. She was only offered for sale due to the winding up of the Sterling (N.Z.) Partnership of which both Avon Park and East Dome were shareholders. The purchasers at \$8,000 were Kerry and Linda Nankervis who farm just north of New Plymouth. Volume buyers of the day was Nigel Watson from Hastings who purchased nine lots on behalf of the newly founded "Wai Whare Stud" of Northern Hawkes Bay. He paid a top price of \$3,200 for a Bavarian/Extra two year old heifer.

Other top prices were \$6,600 for another Bavarian/Extra cow with a heifer calf at foot which was purchased by A.B. Perry Of Palmerston North. Top of the yearling heifer prices was \$3,600 paid by W.T. Burgess of Owaka for a Hockenhull Magnum entry. Eight of the twenty-two yearlings realised \$3,000 or better. Two year olds also sold well with a top price of \$3,800 for a Bavarian bloodline purchased by D. & J. Matheson of Christchurch.



Four cows averaged \$5,737, twenty two yearlings averaged \$2,536 and eleven two year olds \$2,600 giving a gross turnover of \$107,350.

Following the Sale, which was held at 4 p.m. the vendors hosted a most enjoyable barbecue which was attended by over a hundred people. It concluded what was a very successful and well organised day.

JUNIOR HERDSPERSONS COMPETITION - ALL BEEF BREEDS

In an endeavour to enhance the handling and presentation of beef cattle at Shows and Sales the Society has projected a new concept for Royal Shows and Provincial Shows which host the Royal every five years.

Overseas there is a strong body promoting competition for Junior handlers which evolved some years ago. In New Zealand one area has introduced such a project. The Goodall family who run the very successful Braxton Hereford Stud at Mossburn established a Class for young people at the Southland Show some years ago which is keenly contested. The Society has taken the concept a step further by introducing a Royal Show Class which will be open to Junior handlers for all Beef breeds up to the age of twenty-one years on Show Day and will give them the opportunity to demonstrate their handling and marshalling skills in a yearling ring competition before specially appointed Judges. The Class will be introduced at the 1989 Royal in Invercargill and will be run in conjunction with the Braxton Competition through the kind permission of the Goodall family.

Basically the competition is structured as follows:-

Participants: Junior herdspeople, either sex, up to the age of 21 years. Entrants do not have to be the owners of cattle.

Class: Ring Class similar to normal show class for yearling cattle.

Criteria: Ability to control, handle and marshall with recognition for stockmanship, knowledge and self-presentation - (the animal is not judged).

The Award: A return Air Ticket to Australia for two sponsored by the Simmental Society.

Approximately one month will be spent in Australia as guests of a leading Simmental Stud who will provide animals, gear and training in preparation for participation in an Australian All Breeds Handlers competition. At the conclusion of the competition opportunity will be given to see something of the rural area visited.

Age of Entrants: To qualify for the Australian trip, of necessity, an entrant must be of at least fifteen years. (To send younger people unaccompanied would present an unacceptable responsibility to our Australian hosts).

Therefore the winners of the Australian trip may not be the outright winners of the class. (A contestant may only win this award once).

The foregoing applies to the Royal Show circuit which covers five venues throughout the country. (Auckland is not included).

To foster interest in this competition we have taken the concept further by establishing a Provincial competition at all Royal Show venues which will operate each year. (Hamilton, Hawkes Bay, Palmerston North, Christchurch and Invercargill). A Challenge Trophy will be presented and competed for on the same criteria as tabulated (without the Australian Trip and age restriction). In the year the Royal is held at the venue the major prize will also be competed for.

The provision of this Award has produced a great response from other Beef Breeds. While it is a Simmental Award it is provided for All Beef Breeds and in the interests of all young people in the beef industry. In this year's Royal we have at least ten entrants in the competition from Simmental Juniors which indicates a strong class for the first year.

WE CAN WORK TOGETHER

Recently we have seen demonstrated a couple of aspects of how things should be between breeds. In the South on the 26th October we saw the Avon Park/East Dome Female Sale held at the Braxton Selling Centre at Mossburn.

Braxton is an internationally recognised Hereford Stud owned by Don and Doreen Goodall and they willingly made available their excellent facility for this Sale, probably the first Simmental Sale ever to be held on the property of another major stud breeder. To reinforce their welcome to us the Goodalls attended the Sale (as did several

other Hereford breeders) and stayed on for the 'after Sale function' which did go on for some time! Thank you Braxton for your welcome and the use of your beautiful selling complex.

Yet again at the Christchurch Show when we were packing up after the Show it was great to see a group of Simmental people vigorously working to give the Angus/Hereford boys a hand to pull down their display. Such co-operation costs nothing but makes for really good working relationships.



We have received reports in various detail which we tabulate for the record.

The first annual sale of the combined Wai-iti/Rotomara Herds was an outstanding success and grossed \$98,700 for thirty-nine head.

The nineteen Wai-iti/Rotomara bulls offered averaged \$,2726 with a top of \$6,000 paid for a Dunmore Cossack II son bought in partnership by Woody Rouse and David Carter. A top performance son of Kindar Galazy went to D. & J. Marais of Nuweland Stud at Keri Keri in Northland for \$4,000.

Two Relance bulls offered by Raewyn and John Clapham averaged \$1,650.

A total of eighteen females were offered with an overall average of \$2,427. A top price of \$4,700 was paid twice for pregnant recipients carrying embryos from Rissington Bar 5 Fiona and sired by Kilbride Farm Nevada. They went to Society President, Mr Allen Perry and to Mr Roland Potter & Sons from Gore.

The top price rising two year old heifer was by Galaxy and V.I.C. to Austrian Rokko. She sold for \$3,600 to Ross Tegal of Bathurst, N.S.W. She will be retained by Wai-iti and frozen embryos from her sent to Mr Tegal in Australia.

Helensbrook 1st Annual Bull Sale (L. E. McLachlan)


Held at Milton in early June this first Bull Sale was a resounding success with seventeen bulls

averaging \$3,717. Top price for the day (\$7000) was for herd sire 'Maraetotara Prince' a LJB Jade/Empress mix bred by Robin and Gill Lowry in Hawkes Bay. 'Prince' moved to Otago as a two year old and now at six years has made his way North to Waipu in Northland to join the well known stud of Jim Houlbrooke. Another big price was \$6,2000 paid by A. J. Scorgie of Outram for a 'Prince' son.

Rissington Annual Bull Sale

As usual a large sale made up of transferable and commercial pures and a smaller number of percentage bulls. Fifteen registered pures sold for an average of \$4,173 with a top of \$9,000 for a 'Rissington Inheritor' sired bull that went to Colin Hutching of Dannevirke. Another Jade bull went to G. Kemp of Gisborne for \$6,000. Thirty-seven commercial pures sold for an average of \$3,481 and eleven graded bulls averaged \$2,145. The drought in both Gisborne and Hawkes Bay had its effect on the sale this year and once the buying orders were filled (sixty-three bulls) the Sale virtually stopped leaving a number of useful bulls at the end of the catalogue unsold. There were just too many on the day, which was no reflection on what was offered. Rissington as usual did an excellent job in presentation and organisation for the day with a result well up to any previous Sale.

SOUTH ISLAND SIMMENTAL SALE



Held at Temuka in conjunction with the annual South Canterbury Run Bull Sale twenty-seven bulls averaged \$2,529 with a top of \$4,000 for of A.R. & J. Midgley's entries by Single Nick Doubletime purchased by R.W. Gibson, Tarras and the same price for a Scottish Extra Special bull on account of E.J. & D.J. Conlan of Oamaru which was bought by D.G. Mirfin from the West Coast.

The standard of entries this year was extremely good with some excellent entries. Champion of the Sale was a BBA Galant 12L bull from A.R. & J. Midgley south of Timaru. He was purchased by J.D. Graham and J.C. Montgomery from North Canterbury. A few females were offered at the end of the Sale and one outstanding yearling heifer went for \$4,000 to the Glenside Stud at Waitahuna in South Otago. This was also sold by the Midgley family.

Twenty-two bulls were offered this year averaging \$4,721 with a top price of \$17,500 for a Wai-iti Rotomara (P. McWilliam) entry by Dunmore Cossack II. This excellent young sire went to the Levels Stud at Timaru. Champion Bull of the Sale by Rotamara Nelson sold on account of G.G. Pearce (Putaruru) to Atrig Station, Dannevirke for &8,000. Wai-iti Rotomara Stud took 2nd and 3rd in the judging.

The Sale was attended by a very large gallery and was considered sound with top flight animals selling accordingly.

NATIONAL CARCASE COMPETITION

Held in June the National Competition was set up for the second year. This year entries were restricted to an age limit of three years and two classes, up to 320 and over 320. The total competition was held in each Province - hoof and hooks. Last year the top three animals from each area were trucked live to Feilding for final judging on the hoof and then slaughter. This proved to a costly and not particularly successful venture as many animals were bruised in transit.

Despite droughts in many areas entries were good and standards high. Some areas had to amalgamate to make up numbers but the competition was keenly contested.


