

He is interested in people, history, farming, fishing, sailing and has given tirelessly of his time to Simmentals and their followers for the last fifteen years.

It is felt very strongly that Ian's ability to make friends with members and serve them faithfully has led to the strength of the Society today. He once said early on 'the breed will only be as good as the people involved'. All Breed Societies need good leadership and Ian Johnstone has certainly excelled in this respect.



Breeders - keep up the good work promoting and presenting your cattle well on the farm, also at the Sales and the A. & P. Shows and you will stay at the top.


NATIONAL STEER COMPETITION





SALE INSPECTIONS

If you have animals to be inspected for sale we ask you to note the following carefully:-

- 1. Have the animals for inspection close to or in the yards when the Inspectors arrive.
- 2. Provide an area of clean hard standing (free of stones and rubbish) where each animal can be closely examined.
- 3. Have a race and headbale available for examination of tattoos and head as necessary.
- 4. If the animals have come through boggy paddocks and are really dirty give them a hose down.

Over the years we have had some 'hairy situations' for Inspectors with cattle still in the back paddock, bad yards full of bog, no crush etc, and on occasions no one about to assist. Inspections are done for the benefits of the vendor and the breed. Inspectors have the right to reject the job if facilities are not available to do it properly. We will be grateful for your co-operation.

Inspection Welcome

GERMAN SIMMENTAL CALVES TOP SELLERS



The Levels, near Timaru, was the venue for one of the best Simmental Sales held in New Zealand for some years. Thirty-two purebred German calves, aged eight months were offered on behalf of Levels Gentec Ltd., a livestock company headed by Mr Rodney Cox of the well known Levels Simmental Stud which was founded in 1972.

This Sale held on 27 April, was the fruition of some five years of planning and detailed negotiation with a major German Livestock export agency, the German Ministry of Agriculture and the New Zealand Ministry of Agriculture. Mr Cox and one of his partners in Levels Gentec visited Germany twice to finalise selection of the top cows in Germany from whom the fertilised embryo would be taken, frozen, and brought to New Zealand. The implantation of the embryo into the host cows in New Zealand was carried out on Somes Island Quarantine Station in Wellington by veterinarians who flew out specially from Germany and worked with well known New Zealand embryo veterinarian, Dr Eddie Dixon.

The thirty-two calves offered were all born in August, 1988 within a period of twelve hours at the Levels and reared on their 'host' mothers until weaning just prior to the Sale. The seventeen heifers and fifteen bulls catalogued were beautifully displayed for appraisal in a large marquee specially erected for the purpose. Prior to the commencement of the Sale they were paraded on the Homestead lawn before a gallery of some three hundred people representing every area in New Zealand, with several Australians, one of whom flew all the way from Perth in Western Australia.

The Sale was so structured that all calves were auctioned necessitating the Levels Stud to purchase their requirements on the same basis as other purchasers. Heifers were offered first and the top price realised was \$15,000 for an outstanding honey coloured heifer purchased by G. & L. Bain of Outram. Three heifers were purchased by a Melbourne buyer at \$8,000, \$9,000, \$10,000, one went to another Victoria buyer at \$6,000 and one to South Australia at \$11,250. New Zealand breeders took the balance at prices ranging from \$4,000 to \$10,500.

The bulls met a similar buoyant market and the first offered topped the Sale at \$25,000 and was purchased by Mr R. W. Vincent of Perth for his Hamelin Park Stud. Mr Vincent has been President of the Australian Simmental Association and President of the World Simmental Association and recently retired from the Australian Council after seventeen years service. Second top price was \$20,000 and with three other lots making over \$10,000. Three of the fifteen bulls went to Australian buyers.

The average price for heifers was an excellent \$7,750 for seventeen. Bulls averaged \$10,100 for fifteen. The gross turnover for the Sale was \$283,250.

The success of this Sale was based on the quality of the cattle offered, which were by top German sires from top recorded dams. They offered to the breeders of New Zealand and Australian bloodlines a lineage very seldom available. We thank the Northlanders for their great welcome, the hospitality and their organisation — we just hope they enjoyed it as much as we did. My first visit to Northland was in 1974 when a three-quarter bred was almost unknown — perhaps an odd small calf. Some of the animals I saw on that trip left a lot to be desired and for once, I found it hard to make any comment. Fifteen years later Simmentals are there in strength and top quality making an impact in the beef world and show ring.

Such people as the Houlbrookes, Sloanes and Timperleys who hosted us are an adequate demonstration of what can be done with this breed.

A.I. SIRES REGISTRATIONS

Breeders are reminded that if they purchase semen for A.I. use in their herds they must ensure the bull is registered on the Society A.I. list. It is the responsibility of the Semen Distributor to supply the Society Office with the pedigree, registration number and blood type of all overseas A.I. Sires. A fee of \$50.00 (plus G.S.T.) is payable with each registration. N.Z. Sires may also be added to the Sire List at the same fee which is payable either by the owner or the Distributor. The Office must still be informed. With the introduction of new bulls each year it is difficult to keep up with what is coming in and all too frequently the first we know of a bull is his appearance on a Calf Entry Sheet when the breeder is registering his calves. It must be made clear that if the Sire has not been registered we cannot register your calves or produce a Certificate as the computer has a vacant file. Each time you arrange your purchase of semen ensure that the Distributor has registered the bull with the Society.

WHEN IS A BULL NOT A BULL? A CAUTIONARY TALE

If you are inexperienced in bull buying seek a little help from those with experience. We recently heard of an episode where a combination of two inexperienced people put together what proved to be a nonevent deal. One bought a bull from the other and having used it found it was not a purebred and the calves could not be registered. Whether the vendor knew he had sold a graded bull instead of a purebred has not been disclosed, but nobody likes each other any more — understandably.

If you go to buy a bull make sure you check on the breeding and that it is a registered purebred. Also check that the vendor will stand by what he sells, within reason. An 'as is, where is' deal in the bull market doesn't make many friends when something goes wrong.

TATTOOING

We ask that you pay particular attention to your tattooing of animals. Each year in our inspections for Sales we find tattoos that are hard to read or inadequate. The main thing seems to be that 'paste' is not properly rubbed in. At the Northland Field Day this topic was discussed and the consensus of opinion was that the main criteria was to clean the air well with methylated spirits and apply the paste before punching the tattoo — then rub the paste in thoroughly. Before you put animals up for inspection check that your tattoos are adequate.

We record our thanks to Gilbert and Vivien who have been great contributors in the Simmental scene over long years. Wouldn't it be fitting if they won it in its first year of competition and their last!

NORTHLAND FIELD DAY

After a horrendously wet season (some areas had four feet of rain — yes 48 inches!!) the far North was most kind and turned on two perfect days for their field day and herd walks. THE 1988 WORLD SIMMENTAL CONGRESS

(A contributed article by J. P. Absolom).

The World Simmental Federation holds a Congress every two years, and in 1988 it was West Germany's turn to be host. The beautiful city of Munich in the state of Bavaria was the venue.

Unfortunately, the timing of the Congress conincided with calving in New Zealand and only five representatives from here were able to attend.

The first day revolved around Council Meetings for delegates and the arrival of all the visitors. As your delegate at the World Federation I found day one similar to that of any new venture. One tended to sit quietly in an attempt to absorb what was going on.

The major handicap for myself and many others was the language problem. The Meeting was conducted in both German and English and as you can imagine, it took twice as long to complete the Agenda.

I was intrigued to learn what small fry New Zealand is, in world terms. Twenty countries were in attendance, representing 85,000 Simmental breeders. The U.S.S.R., with the world's largest Simmental numbers, was not represented. Spain, Portugal, Mexico, China and Egypt have all been approached to join the Federation.

The overall impression I gained from the Meeting was that a wide range of people (from both wealthy and poor developing countries) are breeding Simmentals. The diversity of management systems the cattle are required to perform under, strengthens my belief in the adaptability of the breed and the wide genetic base the Simmentals have.

The Germans were great organisers and there were a variety of tours for us to take. We visited three A.I. Stations where the bulls were paraded for us. At one Centre they displayed about twenty daughters of each bull to show how their respective sires were breeding. This was particularly interesting.

In Germany, the emphasis over the last few years has been on milk production, but with the lifting of subsidies they are now looking more at beef production.

We visited a bull fattening farm where young bulls were penned in small indoor yards and on slatted floors. Their fattening ration was mainly maize silage, but the huge expense involved, based on the figures given to us meant the farmer was actually running at a small loss, in spite of all the subsidies. Almost all male progeny that are fattened are bulls, not steers

Other stops included a Research Centre working with polled cattle, a dairy herd, a famous horse stud and a show with hundreds of magnificent cows on display with their milk production records. Some were decorated with traditional floral head gear. We visited beautiful Cathedrals and quaint old towns enabling us to admire some German architecture and culture.

Meals were always looked forward to with plenty of lovely German beer and wine, not to mention the food! Entertainment was provided, with brass bands adding to the wonderful atmosphere of the Beef Halls.

The papers on Technical day were given through head-phones in the language of your choice. Four papers were presented:

(1) Fleckvieh breeding in the Federal Republic of Germany

(2) Beef performance of the Fleckvieh

(3) Reproduction of Fleckvieh cattle in Germany

(4) The Beef Market in the Federal Republic of Germany

We were issued with a booklet on each day's proceedings, so if anyone wants information it can be obtained.

Many new friends were made and old friendships rekindled in Munich. The next Congress will be held in Switzerland in May 1990 and will commemorate 100 years of the Swiss Simmental Association. Many people have already shown interest and Ian Johnstone is planning a tour. A preliminary programme is available from the Society.

COUNCIL ELECTIONS

With the change in the Annual Meeting date to December the Election of Councillors will also be altered to coincide with the set time span laid down in our Rules. This year two Councillors complete their term of three years. L. E. McLachlan and J. B. Scott. The seat on the Council held by the late Peter Weenink has been left vacant and will be included in this year's elections making a total of three vacancies. Councillors concluding their three year term may stand for re-election. Call for nominations will be made towards the end of August.

Midgley's South Canterbury property) have taken 1st and 2nd in the open class for 1989. It is the second time these fellows have won at Dunedin.

BIG SIMMENTALS TAKE ADDINGTON RECORD

Two huge Simmental cross steers set an all time record in the fat stock pens at Addington, Christchurch on 2nd May. Bred, we think by Oakleigh Osborne, these animals went through Addington about four years ago as weaners. The vendor, Wally Lowe from Fernside, near Rangiora just north of Christchurch, bought the pair three years ago. At five and half years they were an impressive sight in the yards being almost level with the top rail. One sold for \$1,700 and the other for \$1,870 beating the previous highest price set in 1983, also a Simmental cross, by over \$230.

The top steer was, despite his age, a first class example of what a Simmental should be, trim in the flank and brisket and beautifully muscled. Bought by Bob Seaton and Andrew Adams after a highly competitive auction which involved a southern client who specialises in larger steers for the Otago Ox Competitions, the steers were put on the hook at C.F.M. Works at Belfast. They dressed out at around 670kgs.!!

The top price was an all time record at Addington and could well be a New Zealand record.





STRONG SALE FOR RUFFORD DISPERSAL

Friday the 12th May was the culmination of a long association in Simmental breeding for Ted Parr of Middle Valley, near Fairlie in South Canterbury. The Rufford herd was founded in 1973 and has been run under commercial conditions and with strong management controls to make it one of the top performance herds in the country. From this herd weaners have topped the calf markets in the South Canterbury area virtually since they became available in marketable numbers. The dispersal of this herd has been held due to the owner's ill health but 'Rufford' has not totally wound up its operation. Matthew Parr, Ted and Margaret's son, who is still at secondary school, has retained a nucleus of selected animals and the family property is being sharefarmed until he is old enough to take it over when the herd will carry on under his management and ownership. The contribution of the Parr family to the Simmental scene has been remarkable and an example of what can be done with the breed under natural conditions and good management.

Some hundred lots were offered at the Temuka Sale Yards to a gallery of well over a hundred breeders and visitors who had come from all over the South Island and two from the North Island. Competition was strong from the outset with spirited bidding throughout the Sale. The cattle came forward in good condition after a sojourn in Southland because of the extreme drought in South Canterbury. The offering illustrated the result of rigorous culling over many years which produced breeding stock of quality and size.

Top price of the Sale was \$7,500 for a five year old polled cow of Canadian Extra bloodline. She was bought by the well known Rissington Stud out of Napier who also bought three other lots. Rising two year heifers averaged \$1,588 with a top of \$4,000. Twenty seven mixed aged females averaged \$2,437. Seven-eighth cows also met a strong market selling up to \$6,000 with three others selling at over \$3,000.

Calves also sold well with weaner bulls \$1,600 — the few heifers offered up to \$1,500. Volume buyers were A. Midgley of Willowbrook near Timaru, McCorkindale of Waitahuna, W. Lee & Son of Oamaru, while the Levels and C. J. Patterson both bought a number of bull calves.

As a result of this sale at least two new herds have been established, one in Marlborough and one in Southland. Cattle were purchased for virtually every area in the South Island including the West Coast at what was a really excellent Sale with everything being sold. Several known potential purchasers went away empty handed.

ROYAL AUCKLAND EASTER SHOW

This year the Auckland Easter Show was given the status of 'Royal' by the R.A.S. It was also the feature year for the Simmental breed which gave us reason for more than usual involvement. Held in the city it has very large patronage from the Auckland public with expansive entertainment for the populace. As a farmer's show it does not get a great deal of support apart from those involved with the exhibition of cattle — probably because of its timing and its location. The standard of cattle presented at Auckland this year was excellent and twelve Simmental breeders made a great effort to put forward thirty-two entries. A strong contingent came through from Hawkes Bay to support the five exhibitors from the Waikato and Northland areas.

The Secretary had his 'Easter Eggs' in Auckland this year (and at one stage had a real live Easter Bunny — four legged and furry, captured on the grounds) and the Auckland A. & P. Association provided a marquee for setting up of breed displays which we used but without much patronage as they were in the wrong place. However, time was well spent as a Ring Steward working with the Simmental Judge, Rodney Cox of Timaru and as Marshalling Steward in the Inter-Breed Competitions the following day.



Top of the tree, and we think a New Zealand record, is Southland Councillor, Woody Rouse from Five Rivers who sold his top pen of steer calves for \$575!!

Oakleigh Osborne of Leeston topped again for the thirteenth time at \$470 at Addington. James Russell of Ohingaiti topped Taihape for the sixth consecutive year at \$470 while another commercial breeder made \$436. Blenheim did not have such a responsive Sale but was again topped by Simmentals sold by Chris Gorman from the Awatere at \$275.

There must now be some thousands of Simmental cross coming through the system each year and the message gets stronger each season — they are market toppers and well accepted by the end fattener.


BEEF COMPETITION AT DANNEVIRKE



January 16th saw the dispersal of a well known Southland herd at the Castlerock Selling Centre near Mossburn. Alister and Pam Duncan who have bred Simmentals since 1975 have sold their property and disposed of their livestock interests. At this stage they have no set plans but may move to the more

favourable climate of Marlborough.


The twenty eight animals offered consisted of fourteen cows of mixed ages and two yearling heifers, one three year old stud bull and six yearling bulls. The cattle came forward 'out of the paddock' with no special preparation and presented an opportunity for purchasers to obtain good bloodlines at reasonable prices. The total offering sold mainly to Southland breeders. Top price of the Sale was for 'Canterbury Trinidad' who had Usch on his sire side and Bavarian on his dam ancestry. He sold for \$2,950 representing a good buy for Mr D. Keown of Dunedin. In 1987 Canterbury Trinidad won the Meat & Wool Cup at the Southland Show in Invercargill.

Cows and calves averaged \$1,278 with two top units realising \$2,700 and \$2,650. Two year old heifers averaged \$800 with a top of \$1,250. Two yearling heifers averaged \$600. The six yearling bulls averaged \$983 with a top of \$1,500 for a well grown TRN Mr Pari bull. Another good Balig Agent bull sold for \$1,000.

The Sale was considered sound, in reflection of the adverse season and the time of year it was held. The continuing drought in Canterbury precluded the attendance of many Canterbury people who might have attended in a reasonable season.

With the dispersal of this herd and the departure of the Duncans the Southland area will be the poorer. Pam Duncan served as Secretary of the Southern Districts Club for a number of years with great dedication. Pam and Alister were strong supporters of all local Simmental activities in the area as well as showing and selling in Christchurch on a regular basis. It was fitting that they should be awarded the Levels Promotion Trophy in 1983.

We wish them well for the future.



FEMALE SALES — A NEW FEATURE

Over the past few months a number of female sales have been held in some of the larger herds in the North Island. Generally these have taken place as the breeding programmes of the herds now have sufficient females in the breeding system for their requirements and they have surplus females for disposal which presents a great opportunity for newer breeders to increase their herds with quality stock.

WAIKATO ANNUAL HEIFER SALE

The Waikato heifer sale, started last year, lined up a good selection of animals at Claudelands, Hamilton for its second sale on the 4th April with twelve vendors offering a catalogue of 45 entries, eight of which came from outside the area. Prior to the sale, entries were paraded on a grass area adjoining the sale ring and Mr Michael Coombs of Ohingaiti completed his judging of the offering in three sections. First in the 3 year old section (3 entries) went to Tony Rolley's MMB Thierauch heifer, which sold to a new member, R. Jones of Hamilton. The two year class with twenty entries presented some excellent females and



the star lot No. 21, entered by Peter McWilliam of Masterton, took first placing and went on to take a well deserved \$6,000 at top price for the Sale. This lovely heifer by Dunmore Cossack II of Australia was purchased by the Southern Stud of R. Potter from Gore. Second place went to Gilbert Pearce with a Rotomara Nelson heifer which sold for \$2,600. Third placing was taken by J. & L. McNaughten of Raglan who sold for \$2,400.

Twenty one weaner calves were offered and top price in this section went to Gilbert Pearce who sold another Rotomara Nelson daughter for \$1,500 (this heifer was judged 2nd). The 1st placed heifer offered by Barry Anderson made \$1,100.

The Sale by comparison to 1988 was a little disappointing and some lots remained unsold. The standard of cattle and presentation was very good but the gallery lacked buying strength and the Auctioneers work hard for their money. The availability of other female sales and very bad drought conditions in some areas also obviously had some effect on the Sale.

RISSINGTON HEIFER SALE

John and Star Absolom who are well known for their bull sales at Rissington presented an excellent offering of 46 females the day following the Waikato Sale. The catalogue comprising twenty-three weaner calves, seven two and a half year old heifers and sixteen eighteen month old heifers sold well throughout with only two that were not sold. Top price was \$5,600 for a very good L. J. B. Jade two year old heifer which waas bought by Gerald Kemp of Gisborne. It was good to see again one very familiar face in the buyers gallery — Robin Lowry, past President of the Society, who dispersed his herd several years ago (but retained his membership) and is now building up another. Robin bought two very nice two year old heifers and a calf to add to his herd.

Averages were weaner calves \$1,191, two year old heifers \$2,371 and eighteen month old heifers \$2,806. The Sale had spirit and was strongly supported by several newer members who are establishing herds. Volume buyer of the day was 'Brancott Farm' of Hastings who bought twelve animals to establish an entirely new herd.

SILVERMOYLE, TE AROHA

The Eccles family who came to New Zealand from Ireland in the 1960's established their Simmental herd in 1973 and from the start their objective was to breed polled stock. Sixteen years down the track they are now in the situation where they have a polled herd and on the 1st of April they placed on the market all their horned stock consisting of 43 lots ranging from in-calf cows and heifers to heifer calves. Older cows and heifers averaged \$1,350 with a top of \$2,550 while calves were a little difficult to move with only seven out of the twelve selling up to \$1,250. One buyer knew what he came for, carried it out and purchased 24 lots! Harold Marshall who farms on the top of the Kaimais obviously knew the Silvermoyle cattle well and has added them to his already established herd. In their new surroundings they will almost be able to look down on the property on which they were bred.


