





THOUGHTS FROM THE PRESIDENT

One of my greatest concerns for the Simmental breed at its present stage of development within New Zealand is - COMPLACENCY. Our first eighteen years of progress have been at such a rapid pace, that we are now entering a phase of consolidation. However, I am worried that as we consolidate to become New Zealand's third largest beef cattle breed, we may tend to lose our enthusiasm and drive for the breed.

When Simmental arrived in New Zealand, it was our opposition that greeted us with "just another exotic". We quickly proved to them, that we were here for the long term, that we were a force to be reckoned with, but I give full marks to the opposition. Once they acknowledged that we were going to make our presence felt, they tackled us in the only sensible way they could. They saw that the market wanted tall, stretchy modern cattle, so they quickly moved their breed in that direction.

Suddenly, we are not having to compete against the "old" traditional cattle breeds. This is where I feel complacency has crept in. Have we not as a breed been slow to realise how much progress our opposing breeds have also made in the last eighteen years?

Perhaps the greatest skope for development of Simmentals over the next few years, is to promote the material attributes of the breed. How often have you suggested to your bull clients, that they retain a few first cross Simmental heifers, and see how they perform? Within my own commercial cattle, I have always found the three-quarter bred weaner to be the most superior.

Simmental breeders, by their very nature, must be proponents of crossbreeding. We have sold the breed as a terminal sire, promoting the free gain of hybrid vigour. Let us now at least acknowledge Simmental as a maternal sire. Let's carry the concept of hybrid vigour on step further. As we move into our bull selling season, I wish you all every success. With the effects of the 88/89 drought, particularly through the eastern New Zealand region, total cow numbers will certainly be lower. However, I do not believe the demand for our product will be lower. The numbers of bulls available for buyers to select from appears to be less than in previous years, and the buyers certainly appear to be prepared to spend more on quality than before. I therefore hope we all manage to keep the quality high when we present our bulls for sale. If we all do that, the pricing of these bulls will look after itself. Good luck.

A PHOTOGRAPHIC TIP

Have you noticed that when you want to get a photograph of a non-domesticated animal they tend to move away from the camera? The closer you try to get, the further they walk away. Sounds familiar - the solution is easy.

If you have a modern camera from which the lens can be removed, (this can be either by a bayonet type mount or with a screw thread) then a zoom lens would be an ideal investment. A zoom lens with a range of approximately 60mm - 135mm will solve all your problems and you would be able to take photos of animals from about 30 metres without disturbing them.

Remember also, if you are taking a photo of one animal, try to FILL THE WHOLE PICTURE. We have all seen photos of animals, where they just appear to be a dot in the distance.

Another tip when taking side on photos of animals, keep the camera at least a foot lower than the top of the animal's back. An ideal height for the camera would be half way between the top of the head and the ground. Simple solution-kneel down when taking the photo.

LAND TAX

There appears to be some confusion concerning Land Tax.


Basically, Land Tax is a tax payable by landowners, based on the "land value" of land owned at noon on 31 March each year, after allowing for any special exemption.

Common exemptions are:

- Maori customary land;
- land which is used principally as the site of any residence provided it is not used for temporary accommodation;
- land used solely or principally for business of farming, growing timber, fruit, vegetables, grapes and other crops, horticulture or forestry;
- sports grounds and racing tracks;
- land owned and used by charities (except where land owned is for commercial purposes);
- land owned or held in trust for schools and universities;
- land which is the site of a historic building classified as "A" or "B" by the New Zealand Historic Places Trust.

(A full list of exemptions from land tax is set out in section 27(1) of the Land Tax Act 1976).

If any Breeder is in doubt, it is suggested you contact your Accountant or the local Inland Revenue District Office.

Farms the well known Rissington property which has the largest herd of Simmentals in the country. The property is an extensive hill country holding and also maintains a sheep flock and a small Angora herd. The Rissington Stud was founded in 1972 (Breeding females 383). John was elected to Council in 1984.



L.E. (Lachie) McLachlan

Administers a large farming complex near Outram in Otago running a large sheep flock, commercial cattle and a Simmental stud which was established in 1984 and held its first annual bull sale this year. (Breeding females 55). Lachie joined the Council in 1986.



Woody A. Rouse

Farms at Five Rivers in Central Southland and has bred Simmentals since 1975 when the East Dome Stud was founded. (Breeding females 61). His property is mixed hill and flat and runs a Romney flock, commercial cattle and some agriculture. Elected to Council in 1986.



Rodney N.S. Cox

An inaugural member of the Society he farms at the Levels near Timaru on an arable property carrying a Romney stud, cropping and one of the largest (and one of the original) Simmental herds in the South Island (Breeding females 75). The Levels imported some of the first purebreds brought to New Zealand. Elected to Council 1972 until 1984. Re-elected 1989.



Alan B. Perry

From Rongotea near Palmerston North where he has farmed all his life, Alan has diversified his farming interests from a large pastoral and cropping property to a smaller concentrated unit running deer, horticulture and his Waimiro Simmental stud which was founded in 1973. (Breeding females approximately 20). Elected to Council in 1982.





David C. Carter

Farms a hill country property in the Lyttelton Harbour basin, a high country property near Kaikoura as well as having business interests in Christchurch. The Avon Park Stud was established in 1974 and incorporated the Harlau herd in 1981. (Previously owned by R.H. Kerr). The stud is run on the Lyttelton property. (Breeding females 91). David joined the Council in 1984.

J.D. (Don) Graham

Farms in hill country at Parnassus in North Canterbury. Established the Waingaro herd in 1974 while living near Timaru. (Breeding females 130). Don selected some of the first Simmentals from England to come to New Zealand. He was first elected to Council in 1979.



John B. Scott

Farms a hill country property overlooking Karipiro near Cambridge which runs a sheep flock and the Puketawa Simmental stud which was founded in 1973. (Breeding females 128). John joined the Council in 1986.

PRESENT

The President, Mr A B Perry asked that the Meeting stand and observe a minutes silence in the memory of the late Peter Weenink, a Councillor who had died during the year.

Mr A B Perry called for apologies which were recorded and sustained as follows:

R H Kerr, W Macbeth, A McGregor, Mr and Mrs M J Hall, Mr & Mrs R Lott, Mrs Clare Perry, Mrs Star Absolom, Mrs Jessica Midgley, Mrs Gay Cox, Mrs Loraine Oliver, Mrs Helen McLachlan and Mrs Tish Graham.

MINUTES

In opening the Meeting Mr A B Perry made a special welcome to Mr Kerry Lowe, the Federal President of the Australian Simmental Association, Mr John Brogan of N.S.W. who had come over to judge the Simmental classes at the Royal, Mr Brian Soutar, the newly appointed Society Accountant and Mr Jim Mangnall, who would take over the position of General Manager of the Society on Mr Ian Johnstone's retirement.

MINUTES of the 1988 A.G.M. which had been circulated were adopted on the Motion of J D Graham and D C Carter. This Motion was Carried.

The President's Report was read and adopted. Moved by Mr A B Perry and seconded by Mr J D Graham. This Motion was Carried.

The Statement of Accounts to the 30th June 1989 which had been circulated to all members were adopted on the Motion of A B Perry, seconded by D C Carter. The Motion was Carried.

Committee Reports, which this year had been pre-printed and circulated with the Statement of Accounts were adopted on the motion of A B Perry and seconded by J P Absolom. This Motion was Carried.

There was no business arising from the Reports or Accounts tabled.

Appointment of Auditor

Mr Brian Soutar of Christchurch was appointed for the ensuing year, replacing Mr Graeme Mars who had filled the position for some ten years and wished to retire. Moved by A B Perry and Seconded by I Wright. This Motion was Carried.

Next A.G.M.

This will be held at Hamilton to coincide with the 1990 Royal Show.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Mr A B Perry moved and Mr D C Carter seconded that Mr Ian S Johnstone, retiring Secretary/Manager be elected an Honorary Life Member of the Society at the next A.G.M. of the Society (1990). This Motion was Carried unanimously.

South Island Sale

Considerable discussion was held on the future of the South Island Sale as it has been historically held at Christchurch.

J D Graham explained the reasons for combining with the South Canterbury Sale in 1989. This Sale actually was run at a loss.

Various opinions and ideas were put forward with no real conclusion.

Some people were keen to see the Christchurch Sale retained as they felt the costs and "risk" of taking bulls to the National Sale in the North Island were prohibitive. South Canterbury representatives said they would continue their Sale without the support of the South Island Sale (as in 1989). Southland now have established Sales as outlets for their cattle.

The matter rested with no firm resolve in the interim. From the comments made a few are tabulated.

- * Support the North Island with top animals
- * Have a South Island Sale and include females
- * Create an invitation Sale
- * Continue with Temuka (as for 1989)
- Hold a Temuka/North Canterbury/ Westland Sale

The Sales Committee will again discuss the matter

in detail at its next Meeting in February 1990.

Mr Perry thanked people for their contributions to the discussion which was a difficult one to resolve.

AN APPRECIATION

Mr Alastair Midgley on behalf of the South Canterbury Club asked that the appreciation of the great efforts of Ian Johnstone to the Club over the years be recorded in the Minutes.

Mr A B Perry invited Mr Kerry Lowe to address the Meeting.

Mr Lowe spoke of the success of the Simmental breed in Australia which is now the sixth largest breed in the country with 150,000 registered cattle. He spoke of the continuing necessity for New Zealand and Australia to liaise closely in their objectives as it was a mutually beneficial necessity. The breed continued to expand and be accepted in the commercial situation. Performance recording was producing the desired effect and systems were being continually updated. Sales over the past few months had been extremely strong and ratified the strength in the breed. Mr Lowe wished New Zealand well with the breed for 1990.

Mr David Carter spoke in appreciation of Alan Perry who was standing down as President of the Society but would fulfil his term on the Council. He asked that assembled members show their appreciation of the effort he had put in the administration of the Society over the past years.

This was demonstrated by acclamation. Mr Perry replied and thanked members for their strong support.

There being no further business the Meeting concluded at 6.40 p.m..



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STEWARDSHIP

I don't believe enough importance is placed on the responsibilities of our stewards at either Royal or country shows and in fact, the selection of same often leaves a lot to be desired for the efficient conduct of a most expensive and lavish display of livestock. A display in which each individual animal has had many hours of time plus cost of feed invested in it, and so deserves the best opportunity to parade it and display before the Judge and public alike.

Let us assume therefore, to discuss the subject of Stewardship. We are talking about an Honorary Steward, who has been selected for his ability and his general interest in stud cattle. It is also desirable that he has specific interest in the particular breed in which he is asked to work. One who is dedicated to the true principles behind livestock breeding, promotion and showing. These principles being the promotion of the livestock and not the promotion of oneself to obtain any social distinctions which may be associated with the show-ring or the surrounding public.

Your responsibilities as a steward, are at least threefold - to the Judge, the public, and to the exhibitor. Obviously, one person cannot efficiently perform all three, but under a Chief Steward, they can be diversified to two or more assistants.

To The Judge

You must act almost like an efficient aide-decamp. That is to be the instrument of his instruction in the ring for his every whim or wish to enable him to judge. You must understand his efficiency, and consequently, the correct or best outcome of his decisions revolves around his ability to concentrate. You are responsible to create for the Judge, the best opportunity or climate in which to concentrate on his Judging. He must be able to see the animals well in all aspects - walking or standing in all 360°. Ideally, this must be done without the Judge having to speak to competitors or worry if they are carrying out his instructions. Your prior to judging responsibilities should include contact with the Judge to make sure he is organised, or needs assistance to be on the grounds in time for judging, just as you should show him the courtesy of offering hospitality after the completion of his duties of judging.

To The Public

You are responsible to see that the cattle are displayed clearly for them, the side line judges, to view. The public must be able to follow clearly what is being done so they may make judgement

and form opinions and further follow the Judge's reasoning and explanations. Some pre-thought must be given to the best way to do this and it should be discussed with the Judge prior to commencement of proceedings. With his approval, you are to see that the agreed manner and form of display is carried out, to enable the public to see and participate fully. Showing after all is an expensive form of promoting - promoting stud animals to the publicand the best possible display must be afforded to do this.

To The Exhibitor

The exhibitor is a very vital and sensitive part of the whole showing procedure. He after all is footing most of the bill for this expensive promotion. It is a big help if you know the exhibitors well to obtain their co-operation, if not, their co-operation must be won by your courteous efficiency. You must know or make the effort to find out their names, also the correct pronunciation of their stud and animal names for clear announcements. This way you can give them full recognition of any awards that are made, preferably as soon as they are made, for the public to be aware, and keep an active interest in proceedings.

You are responsible to check that each and every animal is correct, identifiable where necessary and marshalled accordingly ready for the next class. This should be either in catalogue order or order of age, as desired, to obtain the smooth, uninterrupted flow of judging, from class to class.

You are responsible to the exhibitors and the system generally, to see that the exhibitor's correct animals are paraded fro championship awards and just as importantly, correct ones eligible for reserve championship awards are paraded also. N.B.: Don't forget to parade the second prize winner in the class from which the champion was selected. This is so often overlooked, and can create a bad and embarrassing display, where, with forethought and reference to the results, the correct animal can be added to the ring, while the champion is being decorated, so the reserve judging can continue smoothly.

The steward is in charge of the ring and must maintain control of it at all times, being concise, decisive and firm on its control without being over officious with the exhibitors. Remember the exhibitor with a team of cattle has had quite a few hours work under way on judging day before he even enters the ring, and is under a lot of pressure.

PRESENTATION

As I have said, it is all a matter of presentation, therefore, your own presentation must receive your thought and planning and not just five minutes before. Starting with yourself, you should be clean,

neatly and tastefully attired, efficient, on time i.e. one hour before, and equipped to do the job.

Obviously, if you accept the aide-de-camp to the Judge approach, already referred to you, you will not accept or adopt a casual approach and slack presentation - smoking in the ring or lounging with hands in pockets, to quote the extreme.

With yourself well presented and ahead of time, there are many things to check beforehand that they are in order and in the right place prior to judging - catalogues or list of entries plus the necessary equipment for recording results. A suitable blackboard and chalk should be in a prominent position for awards to be displayed. A microphone or loud-hailer must be available for use by Stewards and Judge. See that ribbons are sufficient for all awards; in particular, the necessary champion and reserve champion ones are displayed and available together with any trophies which may require awarding. Some thought in advance should be given to whom you will call on from the crowd to make such awards and so add to the formal presentation. This encourages the press to take a more active part and pleases the exhibitor no end if it is properly and professionally done. At the same time, this pays suitable and deserving tribute to a trophy donor or show supporter in the crowd.

If you have done all your homework, prior planning and arrangements and been able to diplomatically keep the Judge and exhibitor on time, you will be rewarded by finishing on time with little abuse, but probably no praise, except your own satisfaction of a job well done.


- (3) The competition will close on Friday 20 July 1990 and a selection will be made soon after to establish the final six.



THE NEW ZEALAND BEEF COUNCIL

Before discussing the role of the New Zealand Beef Council we should take a step back and ask the question "why a New Zealand Beef Council"? This is a very logical question for a Breed Society of beef producers to be asking.

The idea of a Beef Council was conceived back in 1985 at a workshop held at Ruakura. This workshop was organised by Peter Packard of MAFTech in Auckland to look at where the beef industry of New Zealand was heading-what were its strengths - what were its weaknesses. To this workshop were invited leading representatives of Breed Societies, the Universities, the New Zealand Meat Producers Board, Research organisations and MAF. early in the workshop it was evident that those present had not allowed themselves to be influenced by any particular preconceived ideas of the past. Rather, they vigourously entered into discussions on the future of their industry particularly when the workshop entered into a strategic planning phase. This was most refreshing, stimulating and highly rewarding for those who took part.

An industry lacking co-ordination. Where few of the correct market signals filtered through to the man on the land. Often the signals from the marketplace were unclear. On many occasions there were <u>no</u> signals. In an industry which was fast becoming "market-led" these situations were regarded with some concern by those attending the workshop.

An industry where there appeared to be little action in areas of establishing priorities for national research on beef. Government was severely pruning its budget for research and the funds that were available seemed to be contestable from a widening group of scientists. It was identified that all industries required a strong R & D programme and for an export industry as important as beef is to our economy a long term research programme was seen to be critical for its future.

Finally it was observed by those at the workshop that the beef industry of New Zealand, stood out as the only agriculutrally based industry without an overall "body" which has as its function the concerns of <u>all</u> aspects of the beef industry from farm production on.

The industry was cearly at an important crossroads. Long term strategies had to be determined based on the Industry strengths. New and exciting opportunities had to be enthusiastically grasped. An "action plan" for the beef industry was needed as it moved towards the 21st Century.

Having defined these issues the workshop representatives then set about defining a course of action. One of the priorities was given to the lack of a co-ordinating body concerned for all aspects of beef industry - from farm production through to the marketplace.

A steering committee was formed and given the task to seek widespread endorsement for the formation of a co-ordinating body which would have as its prime function the concerns of a wide cross section of the industry.

Support was quickly forthcoming - from Breed Societies, Producer Boards, Universities, Research institutions and MAF. An interim Beef Council was formed. In 1987 following a successful meeting in Hastings at which total endorsement was received for the formation of a New Zealand Beef Council, discussions were held with the Chairman of the New Zealand Meat Producers Board, Mr Frith, regarding funding a Council. Some commercial businesses were also approached for sponsorship.

In November 1988 the New Zealand Meat Producers Board agreed to an initial grant for the New Zealand Beef Council which allowed the Council to be fully functional. Office bearers were elected in February 1989 and Council embarked on an ambitious programme for its first year of operation.

Turning now to the objectives of the New Zealand Beef Council. It was agreed these were to provide:

- (1) One unified voice for the New Zealand beef industry.
- (2) A co-ordinated communication link acting as a catalyst between beef farmers, stud breeders, researchers and marketers of New Zealand beef.
- (3) An identity to which producers, researchers, consultants and other sectors of the industry can relate.
- (4) Co-ordination for important production facets and management techniques.
- (5) The opportunity of identifying and promoting greater productivity and profitability throughout the beef industry.

During its first year the New Zealand Beef Council tackled two projects.

The first was a series of beef field days aimed at identifying profitable beef production systems. Over 1,000 beef farmers attended these days which were held at Morere on the East Coast of the North Island, Nothern Southland at Glenlapa Station, West Coast at Greymouth, Northland at Whangarei and in the King Country at Te Kuiti. A proceedings was printed of all the papers presented at these days and these have been widely demanded since the series. The highlight of the field days was an excellent day held on Glenlapa Station which attracted between 450 and 500 farmers. Those attending heard how Charlie Smaill with his pure Hereford herd had increased his income by \$1000,000 by yearling mating his heifers and "finishing" all his bulls at 22

months of age.

During 1989 it became evident that new and exciting markets were opening for our beef in Japan and Korea. The signals were unclear as to the requirements of these markets. This influenced the New Zealand Beef Council to enter into a joint venture with Waitaki International to produce a video to highlight the demands for our chilled beef in these new markets. This video has been shown to large numbers of farmer audiences with further copies being ordered by some Breed Societies and other breeder groups. The video is called "The best cuts are the deepest" and is available at cost (\$45 + GST) from Gisborne Video Productions, P O Box 131, Gisborne.

The New Zealand Beef Council also sees its role in providing co-operation in alleviating some of the problems confronting beef producers. The devastating droughts on the East Coast of both islands in the early part of 1989 meant many beef heifers had to be slaughtered. Many farmers had to go into a "herd survival" programme and the national herd then had to be rebuilt. Council expresses its concern over the ramifications of the droughts for our beef industry. It also supported in the press moves by some meat exporting companies to set up contracts with dairy farmers to supply dairy beef animals to fill the gaps in the beef herd caused by the droughts.

It is important that the New Zealand Beef Council is structured in such a way that it democratically represents a wide cross section of the industry with the emphasis being on commercial producers. Clearly this had to include dairy beef producers.

It was decided that the New Zealand Beef Council should consist of:

- Two commercial producers (South Island)
- ◆ Two commercial producers (North Island)
- One invited dairy beef producer
- One appointee from the United Breeds Society
- One appointee from MAFTech
- Two appointees from the New Zealand Meat Producers Board
- One appointee from the New Zealand Dairy Board

In February of 1989 the office bearers of the New Zealand Beef Council were elected. These

THE FUTURE

The New Zealand Beef Council has already set in place a far-reaching programme for the next twelve to eighteen months.

One of the messages coming from the 1989 field days was that New Zealand lagged behind other major beef exporting countries in the area of selling beef at auction on a liveweight basis. In Hawera liveweight sales were successfully introduced in 1989 and the New Zealand Beef Council aims to assist the industry implement liveweight selling at all major beef selling centres.

An early priority next year for the New Zealand Beef Council is to get alongside Breed Societies to discuss their perceived priorities within the industry and to decide where Council can assist. Also there may be opportunities and specific projects planned by individual Breed Societies where Council may be of assistance.

In view of the depleted numbers in the national beef herd caused by the devastating droughts in 1989, Council is planning a series of field days to encourage dairy farmers to rear more dairy beef calves stressing the need to use quality beef sires. Council believes that contracts similar to the ones offered in 1989 are needed to set the price and the standards for weaned calves.

The formation of the New Zealand Beef Council was brought about through the need for the industry to have a body whose main function is the concerns for <u>all</u> aspects of the industry from farm production through processing and on into the marketplace. There is a great deal to be done. The New Zealand Beef Council is keen to act as a catalyst within the industry, helping to identify current needs and future opportunities and to co-ordinate national priorities for future beef research.

The New Zealand Beef Council is also keen to develop effective communication systems so that producers are in a better position to respond to early market signals.

With these objectives clearly stated it is hoped the New Zealand Beef Council will hear from beef producers, breed societies and breed associations so that through a two-way flow of communication strategies can be set in place which can help guide the New Zealand beef industry into a prosperous future.





PURCHASING A COMPUTER

Increased computer sales has not reduced the proportion of people who are buying the wrong computer. This is not a new problem but assumptions that people would become more educated and thus less susceptible have been borne out.

Here is a checklist of those looking at purchasing their first microcomputer.

List Potential Applications

The first step involved in evaluating microcomputers is to look closely at your own requirements and select the areas that may be suited to computerisation. The most popular applications are available as standard packages.

Other applications are spreadsheets for costing budgeting and financial modelling. Word processing packages for mass personalised mailings and other text processing. Database packages are used for filing and retrieval of information especially useful where large volumes of information are needed in various formats.

Firstly Software

Once you have listed your potential applications you will be in a position to discuss these with computer suppliers. This is where many people make their first mistake - they go out and look at hardware or computers and ignore the ability of those machines to cope with the applications previously listed. It is critical that initially you ignore the computer and concentrate on the solution which relates more to software.

It is not possible for a supplier or consultant to recommend the most suitable software solution until they have looked at your requirements.

Having discussed requirements a demonstration should be arranged. Hopefully the applications you have chosen will be satisifed by standard software packages. Most packages will offer an update service and this means changes will not be a problem. It is much the same as having a motor vehicle specially designed or modified to your specifications. It may be necessary sometimes. However, if a standard model will do the job it is a better option.

The demonstration data should have been set up for you as it is difficult to look at totally foreign information and relate it to your own business. It is important to sit at the keyboard and operate the machine yourself during the demonstration. If the system is difficult to use during a demonstration it will also be difficult to use once installed.

During the demonstration ask questions as they arise and judge for yourself how confident the consultant or supplier is with the system. Again if questions cannot be answered at this stage what

happens when you have a problem at month's end and need to get your statements out.

If you are quite happy with the software solution you have been shown the next decision to be made relates to the company or dealership proposing a system. It is critical that you are buying from a company that can totally support you as a client.

Ask the cost of installation or "hand holding". If you are like most companies installing their first computer system you will require support on site as well as phone consultation. This cannot be provided free and if there is no charge there is no service.

Lastly ask for a list of reference sites. Ring up these sites and ask about the service received? Has the software done the job? Has the hardware been reliable? Were questions answered promptly? Were there any hidden costs? If the company is providing little or no service to its current customer base, it is unlikely you will be treated differently.

The Hardware

Having viewed a software solution and verified the credibility of the dealership the question of hardware should be straightforward. If you require more than one terminal (most first time computer users don't), your hardware options will be limited.

It is imperative if you require a multiuser solution that you view your software solution running off more than one terminal. When thinking about the number of terminals you require relate it to hours spent on the keyboard. If it is calculated that the keyboard will be tied up only two hours per day on average, then it would be difficult to justify the cost of a second terminal.

Regardless of the multiuser question, the following should be considered in relation to the hardware comprehensive parts and labour service contract should be available, should you require one. Obviously the system must run your chosen software and if it runs a standard operating system such as MSDOS then this would be an advantage. This would determine that a vast library of software would run on your computer as opposed to a select few packages.

Make sure the system offered has enough storage to cope with your current size plus expected growth. Also check that should your growth be exceeded you can upgrade your storage capacity at a reasonable cost. If the quality of the printed output is important to you then check this.

Having taken the above steps you will purchase or not purchase the computer system offered. Obviously the price will be a consideration, be wary of discounting. This is normally a trade-off for service and support.

If you follow this procedure when purchasing a microcomputer for business, your company will gain maximum benefit form the purchase and the age of computing will be a pleasure rather than a headache.

We have an arrangement with Tekau that we can purchase from them on the strength of orders received from Society Members. Whilst prices throughout the country

vary, we understand that the average retail price of these jerseys is between \$85.00 and \$95.00. The Society is able to offer these jerseys to Members at a cost of \$75.00 (including GST).

JUNIOR HERDSPERSONS COMPETITION — ALL BEEF BREEDS

This competition was conducted at the Southland Royal Show last December and was sponsored by the Simmental Society. The competition was open to junior handlers for all beef breeds who were under the age of 21 years on the day of the show. Two return air tickets to Australia were made available from the Society as prizes.

The trips to Australia were won by Mac Raymond who works for the Westholm Hereford Stud and Janet McLachlan of the Helensbrook Simmental Stud, Outram. Janet McLachlan also won the Braxton Trophy donated by Don and Doreen Goodall who run the Braxton Hereford Stud at Mossburn.

The competition will be run on an annual basis at each Royal Show. In 1990 this will be held in Hamilton during the Royal Show in October.

Basically the competition is structured as follows:

Participants

Junior herdspeople, either six, up to the age of 21 years. Entrants do not have to be the owners of cattle.

Class

Ring Class similar to normal show class for yearling cattle.

Criteria

Ability to control, handle and marshall with recognition for stockmanship, knowledge and self-presentation - (the animal is not judged).

The Award

A return Air Ticket to Australia for two sponsored by the Simmental Society.

Approximately one month will be spent in Australia as guests of a leading Simmental Stud who will provide animals, gear and training in preparation for participation in an Australian All Breeds Handlers competition. At the conclusion of the competition opportunity will be given to see something of the rural area visited.

Age of Entrants

To qualify for the Australian trip, of necessity, an entrant must be of at least fifteen years. (To send younger people unaccompanied would present an unacceptable responsibility to our Australian hosts).

Therefore the winners of the Australian trip may not be the outright winners of the class. (A contestant may only win this award once).

Our new office looks great and we all enjoy the increased space. If you are in "the Garden City", drop in for a coffee, or whatever is going at the time.



Always a strong stock Show, last year's Royal in Invercargill was no exceptions. In the first year of the Simmental Society's combined AGM and Royal Show, Southlanders put their best foot forward to make the event memorable with record Simmental entries.

The Supreme Champion was an outstanding yearling bull "by Mickey Mantel" presented by Alister and Jessica Midgley of South Canterbury, Judge John Brogan of New South Wales, Australia was faced with a hard decision in changing the pattern and putting the yearling ahead of the Champion Senior Bull owned by D C and M Carter. The same situation evolved in the female classes. It was a yearling (also by Mickey Mantel) who won the Grand Championship beating the Senior Champion Cow. D C and M J Carter from North Canterbury had an exciting win to beat J A and M J Robins from Lochiel, north of Invercargill.

The standard of Simmentals at the 1989 were excellent and comparable to any show in Australasia with some very big classes - nineteen in the Junior Yearling Heifer Class, with a few less in the Junior Male Class.

The Royal was also the first time up for the prestigeous Trans-Tasman prize sponsored by the Simmental Society for Junior cattle handlers of any beef breed. It was befitting that in the first year of this Award it was won by a Simmental entrant.

Janet McLachlan, daughter of (now) Promotion Chairman, Lochie and Helen McLachlan who lives near Milton just South of Dunedin. By the time this issue is at the printers Janet will be close to leaving New Zealand to compete in a similar contest in Australia. The runner-up who also has a trip to Australia was a Hereford entrant. This was also most befitting as it was the Goodall family from Mossburn, internationally known Hereford breeders, who set up the first Junior Herdsman competition at Invercargill some years ago. 

SIMMENTAL CATTLE TAKE TOP HONOURS

Simmental cattle scooped most of the awards at last weekend's CRT Southland-Ivomec Hoof and Hook Assessment competition, taking out the overall champion trophies in both the hoof and hook classes.

After two successful years the stage seems set for the competition to become a centrepiece for a beef promotion week in the south.

One of the on-the-hoof judges, John Robins, a local Simmental breeder, presented two special rosettes on behalf of the Southland Simmental Breeders Club to the highest placed Simmental ox and heifer and overall winner, Robert and Katrina Allen of Tussock Creek.

Mr Robins acknowledged the importance of the competition and assured the organising committee of the continued support of the Simmental Breeders Club.

Overall winners, Robert and Katrina Allen, own a 32 ha property at Tussock Creek and lease a further 133 ha at North Makarewa.

TOP CARCASSES HAVE HIGH MEAT YIELDS

The bonded-out carcasses of the winning heavy ox and heavy heifer in the CRT Southland-Ivomec Beef Association competition confirmed the high yields expected by the competition judges.

The overall champion Simmental-Angus ox, entered by Robert and Katrina Allen, tipped the scales at 371kg carcass weight and recorded 263.41kg of meat for a yield of 71 percent.

The yield was represented by 6.52kg of fillet steak, 12.68kg cube, 17.7kg porterhouse, 15.76kg rump, 16.63kg thick flank, 23.56kg topside, 18.30kg blade, 16.50kg roasts, 19.03kg chuck, 68.79kg mince, 20.79kg silverside, 4.66kg skirt and 1.16kg oxtail.

The winning heavy Charolais heifer carcass entered by Tom and Sally Law weighed in at 299kg and returned 208.04kg of meat, a yield of 69.57 percent, represented by 5.28kg of fillet, 10.22kg cube, 13.76kg porterhouse, 12.76kg rump, 13.4kg thick flank, 17.92kg topside, 11.66kg blade, 14.22kg roasts, 14.88kg chuck, 55.44kg mince, 16.77kg silverside, 4.08kg skirt.

CANTERBURY SIMMENTAL SOCIETY FIELD TRIP

On March 24 to 26 the Canterbury Simmental Breeders Club staged a very successful field trip up through North Canterbury, the Molesworth and Muller Stations and around Blenheim.

The Club members enjoyed and learnt from the hospitality of a number of Simmental breeders.

Brian and Christine Logan showed us their cattle and red deer, and their front lawn was appreciated as a venue for lunch.

A swim at the hot pools of Hanmer and a quiet evening over a few noggins saw a slightly subdued lot appreciate the splendid isolation of the Molesworth tussock basins and the surrounding views.

Steve and Nicky Satherwaite of the Muller Station put themselves out to muster several hundred yearling and two year old crossbred Simmental steers for us to see and to explain their breeding policies and results. The cattle have to put up with approximately 230 frosts per year, several weeks of snow each winter, no supplementary feed and yet on average were 50kg heavier at yearling weighing than Angus or Angus cross Hereford steers. Who said Simmentals can't survive in the high country? The Muller is a great advertisement for using our breed as a terminal sire.

At Seddon Graeme Orchard showed us some lovely cattle and gave a few interesting insights to such diverse crops as Evening Primrose and vegetables for seed.

Monday saw us up bright and early at the Riverlands Meatworks for a conducted tour by the Manager, Nigel Taylor and stock buyer, Jim Cassidy. Riverlands is a small works (200 head per day), but showed the innovative, progressive outlook of a Brierly Company. There were several highlights

but the standout was the boning out of a side of Simmental cross steer carcass showing where all the different cuts of meat came from.

The Grove Mill Wine Company is one of Andrew and Biddy Richie's enterprises but their purebred herd is not suffering because of it. Of particular interest here were two Canadian heifers bought at the Rissington - Bar 5 sale. The way these two had grown out and their progeny were keenly noted. Thanks for the drinks folks.

So much was learnt from these visits and new friendships formed that already plans are underway for next year's trip.

GLEN ANTHONY HEIFER SALE

The second annual production sale of Glen Anthony females was held at the Waipukurau Stock Selling Centre on Wednesday 4th April with a total of 30 heifers in excellent forward condition being offered for sale. There was only a small bench of buyers present but spirited bidding especially for the star lots resulted in a much improved overall average of \$1,900.00 per heifer compared with \$1,553.00 at last year's sale. Of great satisfaction to the vendors was the significant number of buyers from last year's sale who returned to buy again this year.

The two top selling females were rising two year heifers and both were purchased by Waiwhare Simmentals of Hastings. The first was a lovely smooth dark red polled heifer by Pinjama Excelsior who sold for \$3,700.00 in calf to Piggot Range Polled Douglas. The second was by Dunmore Hansa from a grand-daughter of Flora - an original German import. This top class? heifer sold for \$3,600.00 in calf to Glen Anthony Tralee.

Nine heifer calves sold for an average of \$1,632.00 with the top priced heifer at \$3,000.00 selling to a new young breeder in Jeff Georgetti of Marton. This also was a Dunmore Hansa heifer out of Glen Anthony Harmony, the 1986 Royal Show Grand Champion, herself a daughter of the imported Haxl cow Glen Anthony Excel. A feature of the calf sales was the appearance of the first progeny of the stud bull Glen Anthony Tralee by Norland Lot. This calf from an Inheritors dam showed plenty of quality, presence and style and sold for \$2,000.00 to Daryl Turton of Hamilton. Four BBA Galant calves sold with a top price of \$1,700.00 being paid by Trossack Simmentals of Masterton.

Fifteen well grown in calf rising three year old heifers averaged \$1,913.00 with a big Neff heifer selling to Waiwhare. Simmentals for the top price of \$2,600. Another Neff heifer sold to Bernie Connors of Whangaehu for \$2,300.00 and two

impressive Dunmore Hansa heifers sold for \$2,400.00 to G B Hurst of Nelson and \$2,100 to Sinderbyne Simmentals - new breeders from Carterton.

Peter Cowley from New Plymouth was once again the volume buyer of the day purchasing seven lots at the sale and a further five cows afterwards. These uncatalogued cows were the mothers of the younger heifer calves sold.

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


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
