

President's report

ATHOUGH drought conditions still prevail in some parts of Australia, members have maintained stock numbers at a reasonably high level.

This may change if some significant break in seasonal conditions is not forthcoming in the immediate future.

Congratulations to all studs who have maintained and in many cases improved their market share with some exceptional on-property, multi-vendor and private sales.

Much of this success is due to the excellent self promotion of their available sale cattle.

Premium prices are available for larger lines of commercial purebred and crossbred stock, but unfortunately these large numbers of cattle are not seen in major store sales.

However, when offered even in these difficult times, the rewards to the producer are excellent.

The great advantage of Simmental cattle becomes evident in these harsh times when fertility, milking and mothering ability in large commercial herds has enabled producers to maintain a very saleable product and income stream.

Simmental cattle have a wonderful future in the Australian beef industry and colour and personal preferences should not restrict the development potential of our cattle.

The astute buyer will always purchase the best finished and retail advantaged animal for their purpose if it measures up to their specifications.

Many of our members should familiarise themselves with this more often rather than being influenced by media hype.

real market worth of Simmental cattle are evidenced.

If breeders can supply a good line of cattle for public exposure, either at fat or store sales, then bull sales should follow.

I would like to express my thanks to the hard working Simmental Federal Council and our staff.

We have maintained a strong financial position, which enables us to have a continuing reserve for future requirements as they develop.

Promotional items have been made available and will be added to as required.

Financial grants have been made to each State during the year to assist in promoting individual State activities.

Tour details for the forthcoming 2008 Simmental World Congress to be held in the UK will be available shortly and will be advised by Simmental Australia's chief executive officer, Peter Speers, who will be leading the tour.

Plans for the 2010 Simmental World Congress to be held in Australia are progressing well.

The Royal shows in each State have been well supported in 2007, with some excellent cattle paraded before a variety of judges, both local and international.

Several breeders continue to supply and show steers with wonderful results and excellent publicity for the breed. This has involved in many cases support from schools with an agricultural component furthering the youth involvement in our breed.

Simmental future bright

ONTINUING drought in many areas has increased production costs and forced reductions in many breeding herds.

Fortunately for those with Simmental and Simmental-infused herds, a return to profit will be faster due to the extra weight gaining ability, milking ability and muscling of these cattle.

Stud breeders are likely to experience strong demand for good quality, high performance Simmental bulls.

As commercial breeders strive to squeeze higher incomes from their cow herds, they will be strongly attracted to using Simmental bulls as a quick means of boosting weight for age and muscling in their calves.

This trend has been reflected in strong sales performances this year, with Simmental bulls averaging \$3867 and females \$3426, both higher than last year.

Sale clearances have also been strong (82 per cent for bulls and 92pc for females).

Calf registrations grew by 22pc last year and active cow numbers by six per cent.

Despite the effects of the drought, the statistics to October indicate last year's levels should be maintained in 2007.

The association's move to promote a wider range of SimGenetics products offers expanded marketing opportunities.

While Simbrah remain popular in northern commercial herds, there is growing interest in Black Simmentals and SimAngus, and solid Red Simmentals are also proving popular.

More studs have diversified to breed registered Black Simmentals and SimAngus.

The Black Simmentals are predominantly solid coloured, polled, typically easy calving, and have good growth, milk, carcase yield and marbling, and are proving a popular cross with Angus to

maintain black colour and polledness while increasing growth and yield.

Growing interest in SimAngus is also likely, giving Angus-based herds an opportunity to benefit from hybrid vigour, and use the range of Simmental traits in an easily managed breeding program.

Our primary focus is on marketing our SimGenetics in Australia, but we should not underestimate the potential of export markets.

The association continues to pursue these opportunities on behalf of all members, and is working with exporters and the new Australian Cattle Genetics Export Agency to identify and

develop export markets.

Sales have been made this year to China, Indonesia, New Zealand and Brazil, with more expected to these and other markets, including Russia.

Many stud, commercial and overseas herds regularly search the Simmental website for bulls and females with Breedplan estimated breeding values and pedigrees to match their requirements.

This is a valuable selection and marketing tool for our stud members.

Members are able to enhance the appeal of their animals by sending animal photos to the office for posting on this website – cost-effective marketing.

The website continues to attract a strong viewing audience, giving members the chance to inexpensively advertise their stud, planned sales and individual animals for sale.

The association provides members with an array of tools to assist their breeding and marketing programs, which include:

• A range of registries – Simmental,

Black Simmental, Red Simmental, SimAngus, Simbrah, Simbeef Performance Register (SPR).

- DNA typing and parentage validation.
- Breedplan performance recording.
- Breed Indexes.
- Beef Class structural scoring system.

- Access to SBTS service for advice on using genetic improvement tools.

Breeders who provide objective measures of these important traits stand to reap the rewards, and I urge members to use some or all the available tools to do this.


As we move towards a new year and the autumn show and sales season, there is every reason for optimism that SimGenetics will be in strong favour and enjoy continuing strong bull sales results.

Simmental and SimGenetics seedstock sales have remained strong in 2007.


While there have been a number of large sales in November and December, the sales results for the year to date have been strong, despite continuing drought in many areas.

Capitalise with crossbreeding

HE strength of the Simmental breed is invaluable when it comes to crossbreeding in commercial cattle enterprises, providing many added benefits to boost herd profits.

Simmental Australia chief executive officer, Peter Speers, provided attendees to the Bonnydale Black Bonanza field day in Bridgetown, Western Australia, in early October with an insight into this when he discussed the Simmental breed and its various genetic strains.

"Crossbreeding allows producers to capitalise on both hybrid vigour and the ability to blend the best traits of two or more breeds," he said.

"Hybrid vigour is the free lunch in cattle breeding, delivering 10 to 25 per cent production advantages, especially for traits of low heritability such as fortility."

"Equally as important is to blend traits to deliver progeny that better meet production, environment and market requirements.

"Since its introduction to Australia 35 years ago, Simmentals have been widely used in crossbreeding programs, producing high quality weaners and vealers with greater weight for age, more carcase yield and resulting higher profits."

Simmentals delivered rapid weight for age, excellent muscling, high fertility, docility and the bonus of strong maternal traits of milk and mothering ability, according to Mr Speers.

"An often overlooked bonus in using Simmentals is the higher value of the cull cows," he said.

"Most herds sell 10pc to 15pc of their cow herd as cast-for-age cows every year.

"Simmental infused cull cows, being heavier and better muscled, fetch an extra \$50 to \$100 each, substantially adding to the bottom line of the enterprise.

"Additional strains of the breed have also been developed, such as the solid Black and Red Simmentals which deliver the Simmental trait advantages as well as the convenience traits of solid coat colour, polledness, easier calving and often higher marbling levels.

"This breed has become enormously successful, providing the crossbreeder with extra flexibility when using Simmental genetics."

Significantly, the calf birthweights were with female replacem

Significantly, the calf birthweights were light – 24 to 40 kilograms – and calving difficulty was no greater than with pure Angus, with three pulled out of 40 heifers, according to Mr Speers.

"The Simmental/Angus calves have shown excellent weight gains due to hybrid vigour utilising the Simmental growth trait," he said.

"Credit must also be given to the Angus heifers for responding to the extra demands of these calves by producing more milk than they would have with

slower growing Angus calves."
He outlined the main designs of crossbreeding programs.

"First there is the common terminal crossbreeding design, where Simmental sires are mated to cows of another breed (or cross) and all crossbred progeny sold." he said.

sold," he said.

"This program requires replacement females to either be purchased or bred in a separate program.

"The second design is rotational crossbreeding, using two or more breeds in rotation between different herds.

"Eventually a two breed rotation will be producing half the progeny as two-thirds breed A and one-third breed B, and half the progeny as one-third breed A and two-thirds breed B.

"This design replaces its own females and retains about 67pc of potential hybrid vigour."

Mr Speers said the third design used composite bulls over crossbred cows,

with female replacements selected from within the herd.

"These programs can be very effective and simple to operate, provided the bulls used possess the blend of traits desired for the breeding program," he said.

"The Simmental Association has introduced the SimAngus register, enabling designed breeding of composites containing Simmental and Angus or Red Angus content.

"SimAngus cattle can be Breedplan recorded with the Simmental Association so breeders can evaluate their estimated breeding merit.


"The main role of the SimAngus is to operate crossbreeding programs, which is especially important in smaller herds.

"For example, SimAngus bulls can be mated to halfbred Simmental-Angus females to produce progeny maintaining half of each breed.

"These female progeny are then also mated to SimAngus bulls to again produce progeny with a similar 50:50 content.

"This process is repeated with new SimAngus bulls purchased as required." Mr Speers believes the popularity of SimAngus will grow "enormously".

"They enable simple to operate, profitable breeding programs that deliver good hybrid vigour plus an excellent balance of traits – more weight, carcase yield, milk, fertility, docility and marbling – all wrapped in a solid coloured, polled, easy calving package," he said.

Embracing crossbreeding

ROSSBREEDING is the first commandment of commercial beef cattle breeding and it will guarantee bottom line improvements, said American Simmental Association performance program director, Wade Shafer, at the Introvigne family's Bonnydale Black Bonanza field day in Bridgetown, Western Australia, in early

Dr Shafer was a guest of the Introvigne family who were promoting the new Black Simmental genetics they have introduced to Australia.

Dr Shafer said crossbreeding has an important role in the industry despite the small numbers of producers embracing the concept.

"I'm hardly going out on a limb when I say that crossbreeding is the one factor that will consistently improve

profitability," he said.
Dr Shafer said hybrid vigour, the phenomenon where crossbred animals experienced a boost in production and reproduction over their straightbred counterparts, was one benefit.

The second benefit is complementarity - the phenomenon of mating strengths to weaknesses," he said.

'Although you can do that within a breed you don't have the range in genetic value to work with that you have when you crossbreed.

"When you crossbreed, you essentially have the entire gene pool across the entire population of beef cattle, and dairy if you so choose, available for more genetic reach.

Therefore complementarity can be just as important as hybrid vigour because you are not narrowing the gene pool when you're willing to crossbreed.'

Dr Shafer also explained when producers have highly crossbred calves from highly crossbred dams they can achieve a boost of about 20 per cent in production.

"The production is in the weight of a

calf due to extra milk of the dam and extra growth in the calf," he said.

When it comes to hybrid vigour, reproduction is really where you get the huge boost.

According to research results, it is typical for crossbred offspring to outperform either parent by quite a lot in reproductive function.

"Producers can get up to a 30pc increase in longevity of a cow because she's highly crossbred," Dr Shafer said.

"That's due to the combined boost that hybrid vigor delivers in production and reproduction.

The US Department of Agriculture estimated that highly crossbred cows with highly crossbred calves will deliver 35pc to 40pc more weaned kilos of calf over the lifetime of the cow."

Dr Shafer believes he has the answer to the low uptake of crossbreeding.

"One of the major reasons limiting

crossbreeding is the anointed crossbreeding method - the rotational crossbreeding system," he said.

You need to maintain separate breeding groups and rotate the use of purebred sires among those groups.

"But the problem is it is difficult if not impossible to implement.

Some large herds pull it off and I'm not saying its bad; but there's a reason why crossbreeding isn't used at the level it should be.'

Dr Shafer said the lessons to be learnt were crossbreeding systems must deliver high levels of hybrid vigour and complementarity and provide it in a simple to implement package.

"You can devise a system that delivers hybrid vigour and complementarity, but if the system is not simple, for example rotational crossbreeding, then producers

won't use it," he said.

Checking out the Czech

THE Czech Republic has made major advances in the 18 years since the end of Soviet control, with notable infrastructure developments and improvements in the country's economic position.

Cattle breeding is an important part of Czech agriculture, with cattle industry income comprising 23 per cent of total agricultural production.

The national cattle population is 1.4 million, comprising 430,000 dairy cows

and 140,000 beef cows.

Simmental Fleckvieh and their crosses comprise 47pc of the country's beef production.

The Czech Simmental Fleckvieh herdbook has about 165,000 registered cows, representing about 46pc of the country's total dairy population.

The average annual milk production of Czech Simmental Fleckvieh cows is 6175 kilograms, comparable with countries like Germany, Austria or Italy,

The breeding goal of Czech Simmental Fleckvieh is for dual-purpose animals with excellent milk production and good beef production.

The dual-purpose type is proving more profitable in many parts of Europe.

A Total Merit Index (TMI) is used, with weightings as follows: 40pc Milk (eight per cent fat, 32pc Protein), 35pc Fitness (Fertility, Milkability, Leg and Udder Structure), and 24pc Beef (Daily Gain,

MMENTAL Australia undertook a trade mission tour to the Czech Republic in May as part of its export market development program. Seven members of the association joined the mission's leader, and Simmental Australia's chief executive officer, Peter Speers, to pursue the aims: to promote Australian Simmental genetics; to promote the planned World Simmental Fleckvieh Congress in Australia for 2010; to foster contacts with influential Simmental breeders and association officials from different countries; to become acquainted with the Simmental breeding and production programs and needs of different countries. The trade mission focused its activities on the World Simmental Fleckvieh Federation (WSFF) Council program convened in the Czech Republic from May 26 to 31.

Discussions were held with delegates from different countries on the potential for developing linked genetic evaluation for Simmentals between these countries.


This would further enhance marketing opportunities for Australian Simmentals.

All participants received a Simmental information kit for future reference.





Furner cracks EU market

EIGHT for age is the main reason the Simmental breed has retained pride of place in two Lower South East South Australian producers' crossbreeding operations.

First cousins and near neighbours, Dale and Chris Bateman, Furner, are hitting the mark in the European Union (EU) market with their Simmental/Hereford progeny and have been continually impressed by their growth rates in the prime finishing area.

Their long-time association began in the early 1980s during the breed's infancy in Australia, and their self-replacing Hereford herds have benefited from hybrid vigour to produce well-muscled, high yielding carcases.

Dale and his wife, Trish, "Kanangra", sell the majority of the steers and cull a third of the heifer drop to Teys Brothers abattoir at Naracoorte between 20 months and two years of age at 315 to 330 kilograms (carcase).

Normally, the tops of each year's February/March-drop calves are sold as vealers in the Millicent market weighing about 400 kilograms at between nine and 10 months old.

"You have got to look at everything when you are selling stock – if they weigh 400kg and you can sell them for \$1.80/kg to \$2.00/kg, it is hardly worth holding them another eight months for EU," he said.

Dale Bateman said one of the main selling points of Simmental-crosses was their flexibility to be turned off as vealers, while they were also keenly sought by lotfeeders who often paid similar money for the Simmental-cross heifers as steers.

"You can get the weight into them because of their growth and if you buy the right bulls they are easily finished, even in lean years," he said.

Chris and Maris Bateman, "Cheverton", have also been pleased with their switch from a vealer-producing Hereford/Friesian female herd to Hereford/Simmental cows.

Since the early 1990s they have targeted the EU market with their progeny because of the better returns per hectare, and because of the decision made by major supermarkets to source feedlot cattle instead of their heavily grass-fed weaners.

"In the EU market you can get the same cents a kilogram for 20-month-old steers as vealers – you can carry a paddock full of steers for an extra eight to 10 months and not quite double their weight," Mr Bateman said.

At weaning, any later-maturing steers are put on irrigation and then sold as store cattle at about 10 or 11 months.

Last year, despite the tough season, their entire draft of Simmental/Hereford milk-tooth EU steers averaged more than 300kg (carcase weight).

Another virtue of the Simmental breed, according to Mr Bateman, was their high

fertility and greater ability to get back in calf at lesser body condition scores than pure Hereford females.

The cousins agreed another plus was high milk production, which ensured heavy weaning weights and the ability to turn off steers and surplus heifers at an earlier age.

South Australian studs have featured prominently among the Batemans' purchases of moderate-framed, easy-doing bulls with both being long-time supporters of the Baker and Hodge family's Woonallee/Waterfront premier genetics sale.

And in the past, bulls from Yerwal Estate at Naracoorte have been used in the "Cheverton" herd.

"Simmentals help achieve what it is all about – turning steers off at the ideal fat cover and reaching the target weight as young as possible," Chris said.

Dalby show success 'good luck'

MISSING out on Brisbane didn't matter for cattle buyer, Peter Hancox – picking up the blue ribbon in Dalby, Queensland, more than made up for it.

Mr Hancox, Toowoomba, Qld, owned the champion single heavyweight steer at the Beef Galore Show and Sale at Dalby on November 2.

The Simmental was one of a pen of five purchased from the Warwick saleyards, weighing 706 kilograms by the time it hit Dalby, and selling for 224 cents a kilogram to return \$1581.

Mr Hancox said after a spell in the paddock, the steer was put into Nyleta Feedlot, Mt Tyson, Qld, for 160 days.

Under the supervision of feedlot owner, Peter Halford, the steer was fed a wheat and barley ration until it reached its weight, and was intended to be shown at the Brisbane show and sale. However, Mr Hancox said "through good luck or bad management", the Brisbane event was missed, and so the steer was taken on to Dalby.

Mr Hancox said he was very pleased with the result.

"Despite what everybody's been going through, there was really good competition there on the day, and we got a good price in the end." he said.

Simmental cattle also took out second place in the pen of three grainfed steers, minimum 541kg (liveweight), no more than six teeth category.

The pen, entered by Erin Vale Pastoral Company, Tibbeneerah Feedlot, Purga, Qld, had an average weight of 590kg and all milk teeth.

They sold for 204c/kg, to return \$1200.

A good business decision

ICK Gittens has good reason to remember the first time he saw Simbrah cattle.

He was contract mustering with his father, Perry, for Mackay, Queensland-based cane grower and cattleman, Graham Davies.

"We'd never seen or heard of them before, but Graham said they were the way we should go with our breeding," said Mr Gittens, who particularly remembers the large size of the bullocks they were mustering.

That was 15 years ago. Since then, Mr Gittens and his father have incorporated Simmentals into their breeding program at their Rubyvale, Qld, property, "Poinsetta", with great success.

As they sell their cattle as weaners straight from the paddock, they began with a trial of three Simmental bulls put with Brahman breeders, selling the crosses.

The result – which included better prices for their cattle and heavier weights – had them quickly convinced.

"It was a toss up between Charolais and Simmentals, and Dad still likes his Charolais, but we find them to be on a fairly even keel," Mr Gittens said.

As they explored the breed further, they developed about 400 Simbrah breeders run complementary to an existing 500 Brahman breeders.

Mr Gittens reckons these Simbrah cows

crossed with a Brahman bull result in the ideal combination.

"We were already trying to maximise the hybrid vigour by selling the first crosses, but the reason we kept the Simbrah cows was we realised they were tremendous mothers," he said.

"I come from a Brahman background, so I do like the quarter (Simmental) crosses

Ultimately, the Gittens family uses Simmentals for business reasons.

"Compared to Brahmans, most of the time we are looking at five to 15 cents a kilogram better for steers, and we are also producing them 20kg to 30kg heavier," Mr Gittens said.

"The same applies for the Charolais, but we find you can buy good Simmental bulls cheaper than the Charolais.

"From some of the better country here – and it is probably higher end breeder country – we are turning them off at 260kg to 280kg."

The property, of 5955 hectares, is run in conjunction with the nearby "Carbine" (2430ha) and another 6885ha property on the Drummond Range to the west.

Mick works with his wife, Amanda, and parents, Perry and Judy.



Breeza breeding herd

LIFELONG interest in the Simmental breed has taken shape in the form of a 280-cow herd on the northern edge of the Breeza Plain, in the NSW North West, for grazier, Paul Davis.

Mr Davis and his wife, Karen, moved to their property, "Allambie", Piallaway, near Gunnedah, after Mr Davis retired from his job as a chief operating officer with the coal mining company, Peabody Pacific, in Brisbane.

With their two children moved away from home with families of their own, Mr and Mrs Davis decided to retire to their cattle operation based on three farms at Piallaway – "Allambie", "Allambie North", and "Yarramilla", comprising a total 890 hectares – to raise Simmental cattle.

The countryside across the three properties varies from loamy red to

chocolate soils with a small amount of black clay.

The pastures are supered every year and consist of a mix of lovegrass, purple pigeon grass, bambatsi panic, and a mixture of clovers.

Mr Davis said the pastures were rotationally grazed. The three properties were divided into 20ha to 24ha paddocks and the cattle rotated every four weeks, grazing each paddock twice a year.

This allowed the paddocks to be locked up for long rest periods.

Lucerne was also grown for grazing and hay, and along with the clover/summer grass pastures, provided a fast response to rain.

"Initially a bit of time was spent spraying weeds but once the perennial grasses became established, this was

reduced," Mr Davis said.

The 280-head Simmental and Simmental-cross cow herd is serviced by a Simmental sire battery consisting of bulls from the Barana, Hills of Gold, and Goonoo Creek sales, to breed replacement females, and are complemented by a draft of Angus bulls on the crossbreeding side of the operation.

He said he was impressed with the Simmental breed's fertility, achieving a 95 per cent minimum calving rate on an annual basis.

Mr Davis began his Simmental herd about 17 years ago when he bought "Allambie", the first of his three land aquisitions in the district.

It was used primarily as cropping and sheep country, however, since its purchase he has introduced cattle and has carried out an extensive pasture improvement operation.

The original Simmental herd was based on a German bloodline bought at a stud dispersal from Roma, Queensland, and included 80 cows and heifers.

With this purchase, and the expansion of his property from his original Roxburgh base in the Hunter Valley in NSW (which has since been sold), his interest in the breed grew in a big way.

He said the attraction of Simmentals was their large frame and good milking ability which was ideal for crossing with Angus bulls to produce a saleable product for the current market.

Their heifers are normally sold at 12 to 15 months of age through the Gunnedah saleyards. The steers are grown out until 18 months to two years, when they are sold, also at Gunnedah, at about 600 kilograms off pasture. Some grain or pellets is used for finishing.

Mr Davis said they recently sold some cull weaner heifers which made \$1.70 to \$1.80 a kilogram (350kg to 400kg liveweight) which he was pleased with.

Following the purchase of some heifers, in-calf cows and one stud bull at the Goonoo Creek dispersal sale earlier this year, Mr and Mrs Davis also plan to establish a small Simmental stud based on about 20 breeders used to produce bulls for their own use and a small number for sale.

Gaining weight, value

HE search for a competitive advantage to fill the void of a declining European Union (EU) market has led diehard Hereford beef producer, Tony Bates, to dabble in Simmentals.

Combined with the best start to spring the fourth-generation grazier has seen in a long time, his Simmentals are on-track to providing a turn-off weight as much as 60 kilograms higher in his weaners.

Mr Bates runs 350 straight Hereford breeders on his 573-hectare property, "Woodlands", on the western edge of the Great Dividing Range just north of Tenterfield, supplying 270 calves a year to backgrounders throughout NSW.

His calves weigh an average of 260kg when he sells them in autumn at 10 months of age.

EU accreditation has traditionally given Mr Bates a premium of as much as 40 per cent, but in recent years he has found that market has become less lucrative and fewer of his calves are going to EU-accredited backgrounders.

Thus, he was forced to look for

advantages in other areas, and when he noticed 10-month-old Simmental/ Hereford calves were making \$710 compared to \$600 for his cattle at local store sales, he decided to get himself a Simmental bull.

"The days of selling straight lines are gone," he said.

"If I can get an average weight of 280kg across the 270 calves I turn off, I will increase my margins significantly without having to make any major management changes."

"Woodlands" now has two bulls, sourced from Andrew and James Moore's Lucrana Simmentals at Texas, Queensland, with the first handful of calves born in June this year.

Courtesy of good spring rain – they have already received 610 millimetres of an expected annual 912mm with summer storms still to come – Mr Bates predicts some could weigh as much as 320kg at 10 months.

"Next year will be the real telling point. I'll have 80 cross-bred calves on the ground in April," he said.

"I put the bulls out for four months from August to November aiming to have calves at 10 months for the big autumn weaner sales.

"I've always been a weaner producer because it seems to make the most sense for my country and the way I work. I can get \$600 for a calf at 10 months or \$630 at 12 months.

"I take a minimalist approach and I was looking for a way to make a gain without changing that.

"I'm not interested in ploughing or having a mini feedlot."

His cattle are grown on natural pastures, which are supered at rates of

136 kilograms a hectare, with the entire property supered over the course of two years.

Molasses and urea are fed during winter just to maintain condition, but no other supplementary feed is brought in.

Mr Bates believes the demand for the crossbred cattle will be there even if, during a less favourable season, the weight difference isn't much at 10 months, because the crossbreds grow at faster rates right until they are finished.

"The schools are even chasing them for led steer competitions," he said.

The plan is for "Woodlands" to gain one

The plan is for "Woodlands" to gain one more Simmental bull, giving Mr Bates four Hereford sires and three Simmentals.

The 50 replacement heifers he keeps each year will be purebred Herefords, with all crossbred calves sold.

"I am getting pregnancy percentage rates in the low 90s with the Herefords and I don't want to affect that," he said.

"I am putting the Simmental bulls with older cows to start with to see how they go calving wise."

Mr Bates believes bulls have a big role to play in good pregnancy rates and has therefore always sourced top-of-the-line genetics, buying from the likes of Truro Herefords near Moree and Franco Herefords near Casino.

"I spend \$10,000 on Hereford bulls and paid \$4000 for the top-line Simmentals, so I've made some savings in that area as well." he said.

"Besides the weight gains, I also wanted quietness and to maintain the red and white look, and that's why I went for Simmentals. The Lucrana bulls were selected with those two traits in particular in mind.

"They have a beautiful temperament."

Quiet cattle are the key

OOD temperament is non-negotiable for Victorian cattleman, Rob Elliot, who breeds crossbred weaners at Thornton, near Yea, Victoria.

"I've had people say that our cattle are that quiet you have to push them through the gate – they won't run," he said.

But that's the way he likes it, and it's a reflection of careful selection and insistence on good stockmanship – they take it steady on bikes, and don't use dogs.

Bulls which show the least sign of being stirry are quick to go, and they have always yard-weaned calves three to four weeks before sale.

He and wife, Kris, run about 120 cows on their own 80-hectare "Carramar" plus a further 200ha of leased country, as well as managing another nearby property with a 170-cow herd and a similar program.

They've been on the property for 20 years, but Mr Elliot's connection with cattle in the district goes back to his late father, Jim, who was an agent in Yea, as well as running a Hereford herd.

It was Jim Elliot who, after he retired, decided there was no need for the district's cattle to go elsewhere for sale, and so about 20 years ago helped start the Yea and Alexandra calf sales which in a normal year now run over two days.

In the early days, the district was mainly whiteface, before a big swing to Angus, but after early experiments with Simmental/Hereford cows, Rob Elliot has

for the past decade used Simmental bulls over a mostly black baldy cow base.

He said this added frame, strength and growth to the blacks, and aimed for 300 kilograms at 10 months.

For the past three to four years he has headed north for bulls, to John Hopkins at the Wormbete stud at Illabo, one of the vendors at the Simmental-Fleckvieh Prime Beef Bull and Female Sale.

He said the Hopkins shared his attitude to temperament and structure, and were ready to back their cattle with information and advice.

He found the Simmental/black baldy progeny grew quickly and attracted


regular and often local buyers each year to source cattle they knew would keep growing.

To address the challenge of finding replacement females, he makes sure he looks after his own female "factory".

He has been breeding some of his own replacements – keeping the Simmental-cross females, and joining them back to a composite SimAngus bull.

When buying replacements, he doesn't put a lot of weight in the bloodlines on the pen cards.

He said to really know what you're getting, you had to know a bit about the background of the breeder's cows.




